Special Populations offers counseling and referrals to community resources in areas of need such as:

The Definition of Special Populations as it Relates to Students:

Out-of-Workforce Individuals:

An adult who is divorced, widowed, separated or has a disabled spouse and is unemployed or underemployed. The displaced homemaker is also one who has worked primarily without pay to care for a home and family and for this reason has diminished marketable skills.

Single Parent (Male or Female):

An individual who is unmarried or legally separated from a spouse and has a minor child or children for whom the parent has either custody or joint custody.

Non-traditional Student:

A student who has chosen to enter training in a field that is dominated by persons of the opposite gender, such as, a male in nursing, or a female in automotive technology.

Economically Disadvantaged:

An individual receiving PELL, WIA, TANF, etc.

English learners (previously LEP-Limited English proficiency)

Homeless Individuals

Youth who are in, or have aged out of, the foster care system

Youth with a parent who is a member of the armed forces and on active duty

EMBARC Program

The EMBARK Georgia statewide network serves post-secondary professionals and institutions to ensure connectivity, share practices, and provide information exchange between youth, community-based stakeholders, and K-12 educators in support of former foster and homeless youth.

Students may initiate their own use of these services or may be referred by college staff, faculty, area high school counselors, social agency personnel or other professionals
